

SOA FACT SHEET

The Special Operations Association is incorporated in the State of Texas and approved by the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) under the Internal Revenue Code 501 (c) (19), Veteran's fraternal organization as exempt from federal income tax (EIN 74-2619854).

Membership in the SOA is open to veterans or members of a branch of the US Armed Forces Special Operations Community who have conducted Special Operations as a member of a combat element or provided direct support to the operational combat element within an assigned area of operations. Our members include combat veterans from all wars including WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Panama, Grenada, the Balkans, Somalia, Iraq, Afghanistan, as well as those from our most recent conflicts in the global war on terrorism.

The purposes of this Corporation herein after referred to as the "Association," are:

- To perpetuate the esprit de corps of the Special Operations community; and

This year's Joint SOA/SFA POW/MIA Symposium focused on a case study of the process and techniques used by USG (Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency and DIA's Stony Beach [SB]) to account for SGT John Jones a SOG MIA from the Hickory Hill radio relay site on June 5th, 1971.

SOA President Doug Godshall and I opened the Symposium with general remarks and administrative comments. The SOA leadership took the opportunity to thank the DPAA and DIA Teams, especially the lab personnel for their continued support. Additionally, for the ongoing mission of recovering the unaccounted-for Vietnam War service members.

Prior to the USG presentations, representatives from the National League of POW/MIA Families and a newly created Mission: POW/MIA organizations briefed attendees on their respective organizations, missions, and current and future initiatives.

Dr. Jay Veith, Executive Director for the League of POW/MIA Families, reaffirmed the League's mission dedicated to the recovery of Vietnam War service members. An anonymous donor has significantly aided the League's efforts to digitize decades worth of historically critical records. Dr. Veith assured the League will continue with their positive relationship with DPAA. He further noted that he and the League's Board Chairman, Ann Mills Griffiths (also in attendance) plan to travel to Southeast Asia before the end of the year to continue the League's decades long relationship with the governments of Cambodia, Laos, and Vietnam.

David Huffman, Executive Director of Mission: POW/MIA followed with an introduction to this new organization. It was formed in February 2023.

While initially dedicated to accounting for personnel unaccounted for from WWII, they have embarked upon an aggressive public awareness, social media and outreach campaigns focused on the Vietnam War missing. He further noted that MISSION: POW/MIA is pursuing the purchase of satellite imagery of incident sites where Vietnam War service members are still missing.

DPAA and DIA's Stony Beach presenters provided the rest of the briefings, and update of their organization's current and future operations culminating with the case study of the recovery of SGT John Jones.

Mrs. Fern Sumpter Winbush, DPAA Principal Deputy Director provided a strategic overview and key updates of DPAA missions with a focus on Vietnam War accounting.

- DPAA has approximately 700 employees responsible for returning the unaccounted-for US personal lost from WWII to present.
- Numbers of US personnel still missing (parenthesis are estimates of potentially recoverable): WWII 72,139 (29,311), Korea 7,486 (7,187), Vietnam 1,578 (1,089), SOG 66, White Star 4, Cold War 126 (15), Iraq and other conflicts 6 (4).
- DPAA's budget for Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24) is projected to be \$196M. As a comparison, DPAA's FY23 budget was \$150M.
- In FY23 DPAA accounted for 158 missing US personnel: Vietnam War 4, Korean War 39, the remainder from WWII.
- DPAA FY23 efforts in Southeast Asia: 8 Joint Field Activities (JFA)/partner missions:
 - Vietnam: 3 JFAs compromising 5 Recovery Teams (RTs), 3 Investigating
 - Teams (ITs) and 1 partner RT.
 - Laos: 3 JFA compromising 6 RTs and 2 ITs.
 - Cambodia: 2 partner missions compromising 1 RT and 1 IT.
- For FY 24 DPAA projects a 300% increase in overall missions.

Mrs. Sumpter Winbush further stressed the importance partners play in the DPAA's accounting mission, stating they complement DPAA efforts and provide synergy to the mission. She spoke of the many challenges to the accounting for and recovery efforts; weather, unexploded ordinance, acidity of the soil, fading witness memories, passing of witnesses, significant cost of operations in SEA and host nation constraints. Significantly, she stressed the 80% of DPAA's operational budget is devoted to the Vietnam War accounting. The lion's share of the symposium was dedicated to an actual recovery operation from initial intelligence to final family notification and burial for SGT John Jones.

The DPAA and DIA presenters laid out the steps involved in the recovery process with a slide show presentation depicting steps taken and photographs of the site.

It first starts with an analyst review of the case to determine what evidence is needed to advance the case. This process can involve open-source materials such as books, photographs, veteran's recollections, imagery and refugee/HUMIT. In SGT Jones' case, a veteran's recollection of the battle was a critical piece of information in the effort to identify the location. In conjunction with DIA's SB team who worked hand in hand with DPAA analysts, SB strategic briefers can be tasked to gather additional information. Once sufficient information is developed to warrant an on-site investigation, a team is deployed to the site to make a preliminary assessment of the viability of the site to contain remains. If this assessment is positive, a recovery team will be scheduled to excavate the site.

At this point, Dr. Nicolette Parr, DPAA-HI forensic pathologist and the Chief of DPAA's Vietnam War Identification Project took over the presentation. She also deploys to on-site excavations with the teams. Dr. Parr detailed with slides and photographs of the Hickory site how an excavation is executed, especially the care that is taken, when either osseous (bone) material and/or material evidence is discovered. In the case of SGT Jones, osseous material was discovered associated with the battle. To make matters more difficult the site had been later a target of a B52 strike. At this point, Dr. Parr provided an extremely interesting side bar description of the identification process, ranging from the role of DNA, the use of dental records, chest x-rays and other information to correlate a set of remains to an individual. At the conclusion of her briefing, Dr. Parr received a standing ovation from the assembled audience.

The final step in the accounting process is the family notification. Once the individual is identified, the actual notification falls in the purview of the respective casualty office. Next of kin are provided with all manner of information, an opportunity to ask questions and afforded the choice of where they would like their loved one to be interred. DPAA staff emphasized that all steps are taken in the process to ensure the fallen service member is treated with dignity, respect and honor befitting his or her sacrifice to our Nation.

A brief Question and Answer period wrapped up the presentations.

Mrs. Sumpter Winbush and Dr. Parr were presented with a copy of the four MIA posters that were displayed in the Hospitality room during SOAR. They will be displayed in the halls of DPAA-HI as a visual reminder of our missing comrades.

The Symposium was a great success. There were 175-200 attendees. One of the largest attended symposiums in my recent recollection.

Its success was due to the very hard work and support of many: The Joint SOA/SFA POW/MIA Committee members with their support and input, Bonnie Cooper with audio/visual, Bruce Christensen helping me identify those still unaccounted-for, Jeanie Huffman the illustrator of the four posters, DPAA and DIA Directors and their staff for supporting this effort and the presenters from League of Families and Mission: POW/MIA.





HORSE SOLDIERS



Colonel (Ret) Mark Mitchell, former commander of the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne), provided an overview of his experiences in 2001 as part of the initial military response to the 9-11 attacks.

The first teams on the ground were Special Forces ODAs, some of whom (including Mitchell) rode on horseback with their Afghan counterparts. The world was amazed when Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld held

up a photo of these "Horse Soldiers" in a press conference and the story was immortalized in a book of the same name by Doug Stanton.

Only 7 weeks after the attack, then-Major Mitchell suddenly found himself on an operational detachment. Rumsfeld had ordered the Central Command to place battalion commanders on the ground with the Northern Alliance. As the operations officer for 3rd Battalion, 5th SFG(A), Mitchell became part of an 8-man "Operational Detachment Charlie" with his battalion commander. The detachment, like much of the initial response was an ad hoc effort.



Two of the eight were U.S. Air Force Combat Controllers who had never met, much less trained with, the "team" that they would accompany into combat. Mitchell recounted that, despite all the challenges, the arduous assessment, selection, and training they had endured enabled them to succeed on the ground.

In addition to participating in the liberation of Mazar-e Sharif, Mitchell served as the ground force commander during the 4-day

battle at the fortress Qala-I Jangi.

For his actions in putting down the armed uprising by 600 Taliban and al Qaeda fighters, Mitchell received the Distinguished Service Cross. Mitchell closed out his remarks by sharing detail about re-opening the airfield in Mazar-e Sharif and later burying a piece of the World Trade Center (which were given to each team) and presenting a map with all the locations to the 9-11 Museum in New York.

The SOA has been fortunate to have representatives from the VA attend the last 3 SOARS providing compensation claims support and benefit information.



VADM Ann Duff, Dorian Jenkins, George Grogan and Alisha Flores from the P&F's Office of Survivors Assistance (OSA), along with Larry Provost, from the National Cemetery Administration briefed Veterans and spouses about available survivor benefits.

Ann also met separately with spouses during the SOAFAC meeting providing information on survivor's benefits.




Robert Reynolds, Deputy Under Secretary for Disability Assistance (DUSDA) briefed the membership on benefits.



VA representatives personally met with over 250 Veterans and their families. OTED took in 115 compensation claims.

The SOA Board and membership are extremely grateful for the VA's attendance.

POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS INJURY (PTSI)

John "Doc" Padgett has researched new as well as long-established treatments for post-traumatic stress injury (PTSI) and discussed these considering the risks and benefits of the methods used the most.

The signs and symptoms of PTSI were reviewed, as well as the similarity and differentiation of traumatic brain injury, which can co-exist with PTSI.

There are now approximately two million veterans of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, and approximately 15% of these, or 280,000 have been treated for PTSI.

While this number is impressive, not all cases have been reported or diagnosed. This is also true with Viet Nam combat veterans.

Doc discussed the current modalities of PTSI therapy, to include medication, group, and cognitive therapy, as well as the recent use of psychedelics.

He also presented a newer and very effective modality called Reconciliation of Traumatic Memories (RTM). This therapy is safe, with no drugs. It is non-threatening, non-invasive (no injections or electrodes) and the results are usually rapid with minimal regression.

He suggested that this therapy be investigated by anyone currently experiencing PTSI symptoms. Any member or family member seeking more information on PTSI and/or TBI may contact Doc Padgett directly at bacsi10@yahoo.com.

Aviation Symposium

The 2024 Aviation Symposium featured the 195th Assault Helicopter Company's "special mission helicopter operations", from their formation at Ft. Carson, Colorado, training and shipment to Vietnam until they ceased flying SOG missions in June of 1970. Their in-country training and supporting special projects B-56 Sigma, B-50 Omega, and B-52 Delta.



The presenters were 2nd platoon "Ghost Riders" slick Crew Chief Don Haase and gun platoon "Thunder Chickens" Crew Chief Joel "Lil Mac" McDaniel. They went through helicopter maintenance school at Ft. Eustis, Virginia, and helped form the unit at Ft. Carson. When they reported to the 195th Headquarters at Ft. Carson, Colorado, in January of 1967, outside of the supply Sgt. and a PFC under him, they were the first men in the company.



They put together an outline of the history of the 195th. Aviation Company/Assault Helicopter Company using company historical notes, award citations, and the book Secret Green Beret Commandos in Cambodia by Lieutenant Colonel Fred S. Lindsey, USA (Ret). From that outline, they put together a slide show using rare photos of operations at Ft. Carson, transportation to Vietnam, and operations in Vietnam.

The company was formed at Camp Holloway, Pleiku, RVN, by then Captain Earl Carlson, who had worked with Special Forces at Ft. Bragg in the early 1960s and then moved to Pleiku, Vietnam, as part of the 81st Transportation Company, one of the first two helicopter units shipped to Vietnam with CH 21 Shawnee helicopters. Captain Carlson felt that those two experiences were why he was given command as a Captain. He was soon promoted to Major. The company's senior officers and NCOs had previous tours in Vietnam, but all the pilots and enlisted men were straight out of AIT schools.

The company trained all spring and summer of 1967 then on August 28, 1967, 31 aircraft left Ft. Carson bound for Long Binh, Vietnam. Flying to Oakland, California, arriving three days later with all 31 aircraft. It was a rare feat for helicopter units shipping to Vietnam out of Sharpe Army Depot, California. The aircraft were cocooned and placed aboard the USNS "Sea Train Washington," an aircraft transport ship, by maintenance personnel and Crew Chiefs for transocean shipment. The rest of the equipment was loaded on railroad flat cars and shipped to Oakland, California, and then to Vietnam.

The men boarded the USNS General Nelson Walker, a troop transport ship. This was the last troop transport mission for the USNS Walker, spanning back to WWII. After thirty days at sea, the USNS Walker approached the coast of Vietnam at Cam Ranh Bay. The two thousand troops on board awaited their fate in Vietnam. Three days later, the men of the 195th were offloaded at Vung Tau. After building our new home, the aircrews trained with our sister companies, the 191st and 240th AHCs of the 214th Aviation Battalion, 1st Aviation Brigade.

On December 1, 1967, the 195th AHC began combat operations supporting the "Special Operations Group". The January 1968 Unit Historical notes state we are supporting the more familiar "Studies and

Observation Group." Thus, the name change had occurred.

On January 29, 1968, the 195th lost its first aircraft in a hot LZ. Crew chief Wendell Skinner was pinned

under the aircraft and left for dead for six hours. After returning from Song Be and learning of Wendell's fate, Major Carlson exclaimed, "We do not leave our men behind." Major Carlson made a daring one-ship rescue mission after midnight without gunship support. "All in a day in SOG." A day later, the TET offensive started. Wendell Skinner and Major Carlson did not meet again for 50 years.

The TET offensive of 1968 stretched the aircrews of the 1st Aviation Brigade to their limits. Many days were 20 hours long, flying missions and maintaining aircraft. After the May offensive, the 195th returned to supporting the SOG missions full-time. At that time, the 195th commanding officer, Major Hummel, and Col. Drake, commander of B-56 Sigma, needing to make our aircraft and crews sterile, made a deal with the Air Force paint crews at Bien Hoa Air Force base to paint the 195th aircraft in the Air Force camo paint scheme. They traded 31 AK-47s for 31 aircraft paint jobs. The 195th was Vietnam's only Army aviation unit that authorized camo paint jobs.

Later, in the summer of 1968, 195th Air Crews Extracted a six-man recon team and a separate thirty-man Hatchet force in a Prairie Fire emergency. These extractions were made as a Typhoon blew in from the South China Sea. Colonel Drake put 195th pilots in for one Silver Star and eight Distinguished Flying Crosses. General Robert R. Williams presented the awards at a ceremony in the 195th Company area. In September, the 195th supported B-52 Delta at Quan Loi in Operation 5-68 (Alamo), another first for the 195th. A delta recon team discovered a large ammo cache. The 195th inserted the 81st Ranger Battalion, Delta's reaction force, and they captured the cache. It consisted of 547,000 AK-Forty-seven rounds and required fourteen Chinook sorties to remove. Throughout 1969 Skychief crewmen received one DSC, Fifteen silver stars, one hundred two ARCOMS, Forty-two DFCs and two hundred and ninety-eight Air Medals for their service in the Republic of Vietnam.

All missions conducted through the latter part of 1969 were to be continued through 1970 with no

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further changes required. On June 7, 1970, the 195th ceased operations supporting Special Forces reconteams and Hatchet Forces.

GHOST SOLDIERS OF EL SALVADOR



At this year's SOAR I was privileged to present an hour-long symposium pertaining to the significant input, actions, and leadership of MACV SOG veterans during the 10-year civil war in El Salvador. Contributions that led to the rebuilding and deployment of not only El Salvador's special operations capabilities but those of the conventional army, as well.

That presentation, the first of its kind that I am aware of, has since been provided to the Command Historian at Fort Bragg for his archives on that US military campaign as acknowledged by the US Congress in 1996.

That acknowledgement includes an AFEM and all combat awards and decorations for all Services which sent Soldiers, Sailors, Marines, Airmen, and Coast Guardsmen to El Salvador, with 21 of these killed in action and numerous others wounded or injured during their tours.

SOAR XLVII Keynote Speaker was General Bryan P. Fenton, currently serving as the 13th Commander of U.S. Special Operations Command (USSOCOM) headquartered at MacDill Air Force Base in Tampa, Florida.

Prior to assuming command of USSOCOM, General Fenton served as the Commander of Joint Special Operations Command at Fort Bragg, NC. General Fenton's other assignments as a general officer include Senior Military Assistant to the Secretary of Defense; Deputy Commander, Indo-Pacific Command; Commander, Special Operations Command Pacific; Assistant Chief of Staff G-3, U.S. Army Pacific; Deputy Commanding General – Operations, 25th Infantry Division; and Deputy Director of Strategy, Plans and, Policy, Department of the Army.

His Army and special operations assignments include Director of Operations (J3), Joint Special Operations Command from 2012 to 2013; Brigade Command from 2010 to 2012; Squadron and Battalion Commands from 2005 to 2009, to include command at the John F. Kennedy Special Warfare Center and School at Fort Bragg, NC.

General Fenton has served in multiple geographic combatant commands including U.S. Southern Command; U.S. European Command; U.S. Africa Command; U.S. Central Command; and U.S. Indo-Pacific Command. He participated in Operations Joint Forge (Bosnia), Enduring Freedom (Afghanistan/Africa), Iraqi Freedom and Odyssey Dawn (Libya).

General Fenton's many military courses include: the U.S. Army Infantry Officer Basic and Advance Courses; Special Forces Qualification Course; Ranger School; Special Forces Language training (Spanish); U.S. Army Jump Master; and the Special Forces Military Free Fall School.

General Fenton holds a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from University of Notre Dame, and a Master's Degree from the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College. He attended Negotiation/Leadership Training at Harvard University and served as the 2009 Army Fellow at the Institute for the Study of Diplomacy, Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. General Fenton and his wife Dawn have two daughters.

2. Financial Reports (See AAR Reports) Treasurer Devon

SOAR GMM MINUTES

 \bullet SOA – A 501(c)19 corporation. The Balance Sheet shows a total of \$623,000 assets,

\$8,500 of temporary liabilities, and \$614,000 of equity. The Total Assets and Liabilities comparison is \$94,000 on a year over year basis. The income during the nine-month year to date period is \$169,000. Treasurer Devon cautioned that the figures are skewed to the positive as they do not yet show anticipated expenses of about \$70,000 incurred at SOAR. Despite this, the financial health of the SOA will remain very strong.

 \bullet SOAF- A 501(c)3 corporation. The Balance Sheet shows a total of \$53,000 assets, \$0

liabilities, and \$53,000 of equity. The Total Liabilities and Equity comparison year over year is \$32,000 which reflect improved fundraising efforts. The income during the nine-month year to date period is \$21,000.

- 3. SOA Foundation Report Ex Director Padgett began by recounting the Foundation's efforts to find members that might have been affected by the recent fires in Maui. Fortunately, no members were affected by this, but in the future the Foundation will continue to aid members affected by natural disasters. He encouraged members to contribute to the SOAF so that this worthwhile activity can be sustained in the future. Ex Director Padgett also noted that he and Gen. Bowra and Vice-President King will be doing a "Lessons Learned" presentation at Fort Bragg. At this event, Gen. Bowra will represent the "then" and Vice-President King will be the "now".
- 4. SOA Scholarship Committee Report. President Godshall President Godshall commented that with the costs of higher education hovering at around \$25,000 the Committee had increased the awards to our deserving scholarship candidates. Presently, four very good candidates were granted \$4,000 each. This program benefits the families of all members and donations are encouraged.
- 5. SOA Brightlight Committee Report. Chairman Owens Chairman Owens was gratified that the Committee was able to assist some members in attending SOAR this year. He thanked everyone for their support and especially Larry Trimble, Marcus Whitt, and the SOA riders for their contributions to the fund. 

MEMBERSHIP REPORT

The Membership Committee has been active in processing applications for membership, changes in membership status, changes in contact information, and answering questions from prospective members by email and telephone calls. It has also assisted the Board of Directors with their specific requests, particularly advising the Board of Directors regarding Honorary membership nominees. Lastly, the Membership Committee has processed Warrior Widow requests.

The SOA President requested during a Board of Directors meeting at the beginning of 2023 that the Membership Committee assume responsibility for recruiting efforts for the SOA. An Ad Hoc Membership Recruitment Committee was created shortly after that meeting. Sixteen riders and ten significant others participated and biked for three days, over 441 miles through eastern Tennessee and western North Carolina.




